Welcome to the inaugural Manly Writers' Festival

Our two-and-a-bit day gathering of storytelling, writing, and ideas in beautiful Manly runs from Thursday 14 March to Saturday 16 March 2024.

More than 70 writers, academics, journalists, publishers, thinkers and creators will appear across more than 40 events in our venues on The Corso and North Steyne in Manly and in Brookvale.

Australians love a good yarn and to have a chat. It follows that we also love our literary events, of which there were more than 140 across the country at last count, and none more so than the biggest and most celebrated of the lot – the Sydney Writers' Festival held in May each year.

So why have another writers' festival in Manly?

As a local, independent publisher who specialises in non-fiction sport, I am acutely aware that some writers – some of whom put literally decades of research into their book – do not always have an opportunity to talk about their work. It is one of the reasons why I started a Football Writers' Festival in 2019, the only single sport literary festival in the world, other than in the United Kingdom.

But having also published some local authors with our other imprints, I am conscious that there are many writers on the Northern Beaches who similarly do not get an opportunity to talk about their work, especially those published by small publishers. They include both fiction and non-fiction writers.

In addition, while many associate Manly with - and residents love the area because of - the beach and the "best commute in the world" (aka the Manly Ferry), it's a way to show to the rest of Sydney and Australia that there is more to Manly and the Northern Beaches than the beach and the ferry.

Our hope is to make the Manly Writers' Festival an annual gathering as a beacon for literary activities for the entire community.

We want to bring writers, readers, and thinkers together from wherever they live to celebrate the power and the common humanity in storytelling.

We want to host discussions that energise, inform, and inspire; they may be issues you disagree with, but nonethless we see informed, respectful, and vigorous interchange as key to the type of community and society we want to nurture and cherish.

Key to that, of course, is also involving children in the Manly Writers' Festival as a way to increase their interest in reading and writing. We are doing this in our first year with presentations and workshops for students from school Years 3 to 10 on a diverse range of subjects relevant to the school curriculum.

I want to give a special thank you to Cunninghams Real Estate for their support for this inaugural festival as the Founding Partner. Without them, as well as Fair Play Publishing, the festival would not be possible.

I would also like to thank the Northern Beaches Council, TGI Holdings, Gleebooks, and Your Body Physio and Pilates for their support.

Thank you also to Jeanne Ryckmans, Liz Deep-Jones, and Michele Seminara for their time, advice, and input; as well as Jill Valentine for her time, advice and work. All gave freely.

The Manly Writers' Festival is fortunate to have the support of an enthusiastic group of volunteers led by Libby Walstab, and we are grateful to the trailblazers who have signed-on as the first Friends of the Festival.

Some of the Northern Beaches' and Australia's finest thinkers, writers, and journalists are coming to Manly... and they want to have a chat.





The accidental historian

John Maynard happen-chanced into history when he visited the University of Newcastle to help with some family research on his grandfather, Fred, who had been a high-profile Aboriginal activist of the 1920s. Following the visit to the university, and a meeting with a Murri woman at the university who encouraged him to take his interest further, John completed his education and the rest - as they say - is history.

John's research has concentrated on the intersections of Aboriginal political and social history and made significant contributions to the research fields of Aboriginal, race relations and sports history both nationally and internationally. 





An unimaginable nightmare

Shirley Singh and her husband were in Fiji attending a family wedding when a 'phone call in the early hours from Queensland Police informed her that three of her four children had been found dead – murdered – in the family home.

In Shirley's Story, journalist and author Emily Eklund Power tells the story of every parents' worst nightmare and what Shirley Singh had to endure to bring the perpetrator to justice. Strong, sassy, passionate, and loving, Shirley depended on her love for her children, her faith in God, and her decision to keep a 'clean state of mind' to overcome alcohol and substance abuse while battling mental illness to help catch the killer. When her only surviving child died of a brain aneurysm in February 2020, Shirley was once again forced to dig deep, finding strength in memories captured over 43 years.

The accidental farmer



Olympic boycotts, death threats, doping, and a Cold War

Against the backdrop of the Soviet Union's invasion of Afghanistan, the 1980 Moscow Olympics was always going to be political. Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser wanted Australia's Olympic athletes to boycott the Games, in line with the USA, but many of the athletes had a different view and competed under the Olympic flag. Whatever flag they competed under at Moscow, athletes were the victims - and most of them female. As Paris prepares to host the 2024 Olympics, 100 years after the Modern Olympics founding father Pierre de Coubertin declared that "Women have one task, that of the role of crowning the winner with garlands", an indifference to female athletes lives on.

In Turning the Tide, 800 metres Swimming Gold Medal winner, Michelle Ford, charts the highs and lows from the beaches of Sydney to the dizzy heights of Olympic swimming gold in the middle of the Cold War. Along with the politics, death threats, wilful blindness and sexism, the world also witnessed the most ferocious, systematic, state-sponsored doping ever

Jewish Life

Born in a displaced persons' camp in 1947, Michael Gawenda spent his childhood and teenage years in a left-wing non-Zionist Jewish youth group in Melbourne. This shaped the person he became — a secular Jew who loved the Yiddish language and Yiddish culture. Gawenda went on to become a public figure during his 40 years as a journalist and editor-in-chief of The Age. Throughout this time, and since, he became dismayed and pained by the growing hostility of the left to Israel and to Jews like him who were not prepared to declare themselves as anti-Zionists. This has also forced him to examine his own Jewish identity and his relationships with his Jewish friends, and to forensically examine the basis of the critiques of Israel.

Just Gladys

Born in Manly to Armenian parents from Palestine and Syria, Gladys Berejiklian was one of Australia's most popular premiers. She forged a path for NSW during the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic and seemed unstoppable. But it all came crashing down when she found herself in the middle of a corruption inquiry into a man with whom she had a secret relationship. Slowly, that inquiry extended to Berejiklian also. Journalist Paul Farrell makes the case for why anti-corruption bodies are important, and asks tough questions about the state of our democracy and how Berejiklian maintained her popularity – at one stage even considered as the possible Liberal candidate for the seat of Warringah – despite the negative attention.

The state of our media

If journalism is the first draft of history, what will it say about the state of the media? But just as the fictional US President Jed Bartlett used the Bible to dismiss the discriminatory views of ultraconservative Christians in an episode of West Wing, Constantine Campbell uses the Bible as the basis for calling out the cognitive dissonance amongst those who call themselves 'evangelicals' and for whom moral credibility has been lost in the pursuit of political power.
